
Should Schwartz Centre Rounds be incorporated into the medical school curriculum? A qualitative and quantitative exploration of students' views

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




Figure 2: Percentage responding "Yes" or "No" to questions 5-

Discussion

- Poor attendance at the SCR for the Year 6 students likely due to it taking place shortly before final exams
- > Responses to the questionnaire were similar for year 5 and 6 students. Apart from:
- More Year 6 students reported worry about compassion fatigue
- More Year 6 students found the open discussion helpful
- Large size of audience was raised a negative factor, as many students were too intimidated to speak up during the discussion

Conclusion

- $\succ\,$ SCRs have been taking place in hospitals in the US and UK for several years
 - credited with creating a culture than encourages interdisciplinary communication and fosters resilience among health care professionals.
- $\succ\,$ The first UK pilots of SCRs for medical students received positive feedback
 - majority would welcome their integration into the curriculum.
- Further consideration is required around timing and format to optimise participation and enhance benefits to students.
- Training of staff and costs present practical issues regarding embedding and sustaining SCRs into the medical school culture.
